# The 2015–2016 School Budget

A Message from Our Superintendent Dawn A. Santiago-Marullo, Ed.D.



Building the 2015-2016 school budget has been challenging. This year, for the first time in recent history, the Governor withheld estimated budget runs, critical projections which enable districts to plan their budgets for the best and worst case scenarios.

Budget runs are just one factor that made creating this year's budget challenging. A variety of issues continued to cast a shadow on brighter budget times. One of them was the Governor's proposal to withhold state funding unless legislators agreed to his education reforms. Other negative factors included the ongoing Gap Elimination Adjustment, the freeze on Foundation Aid and the New York State tax cap.

Governmental influences are not the only thing that Victor Central Schools has faced this budget season. Unlike most districts in the area, our school community continues to grow. Over the past eight years, Victor Central Schools has added nearly 500 new students, none of which were funded by State Foundation Aid which historically was based on student population data.

Our student population will continue to be a factor as we add more students in the 2015-2016 school year. As a result of this influx in enrollment and a few retirements, we will be adding a variety of full and part time positions in the coming year, among them, an English Language Learners' teacher (formerly English Speakers of other Languages), a Physical Education teacher, three Academic Intervention

Services teachers, a clerical position and several teacher aides.

Our proposed budget weighs all of these factors, and more. Based on the passage of the New York State budget in April, Victor Central Schools received slightly more money than we anticipated. As such, our 2015-2016 is cautiously optimistic, coming in at \$63,969,683.

The projected true value tax rate for the 2015-2016 school year is equally conservative at \$16.48 per thousand, a zero percent increase from this year's true value tax rate.

As I say each year, the budget process is about much more than dollars and decimal points, it is about positive school dynamics and building a foundation that provides our students, staff, parents and community members with the very best environment possible to live and learn in.

The budget process is a long, laborious road, but as always, this District has made the most out of a difficult situation. Thanks to this community's advocacy, creativity, talent and support we will continue to provide students with an education that will prepare them for their future.

The 2015-2016 budget represents a bright future based on our continued commitment to excellence.



### Bus Purchase Proposition

School bus fleet maintenance and safety are driving a bus purchase proposition on the ballot May 19, 2015. Residents will be asked to approve the purchase of six 77-passenger buses and one school van.

The proposition totals \$855,000. New York State will provide more than 60 percent of the funding through NYS Transportation Aid. The new buses will replace vehicles that are at least 12 years old and have mileage in excess of one hundred thousand miles.

**Notice is further given** that a Bond Proposition in substantially the following form shall be presented to the qualified voters of the District at such Annual District Meeting and Election.

### Bond Proposition Resolved:

- (a) That the Board of Education of the Victor Central School District, in the Counties of Ontario, Monroe and Wayne, New York (the "District"), is hereby authorized to purchase various school buses for use by the District; and to expend therefor, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and to the financing thereof, an amount not to exceed the estimated total cost of \$855,000;
- (b) that a tax is hereby voted in the aggregate amount of not to exceed \$855,000 to pay such cost, said tax to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as shall be determined by said Board of Education; and
- (c) that in anticipation of said tax, bonds of the District are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of not to exceed \$855,000 and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said bonds as the same shall become due and payable.



# Victor Central School 2015-16 Budget Revenue Plan



### 2014-15 True Tax Rate Comparison



The figures above represent the true value tax rate per \$1,000 of home assessment. In comparing the 2014-15 true value tax rates among Ontario County schools plus our contiguous and academic benchmark districts in Monroe County, Victor's true tax rate was the **lowest at \$16.48 per thousand**.

### STAR Program Information

The NYS School Tax Assessment Relief (STAR) program provides qualified homeowners with a \$30,000 assessment reduction for tax purposes. Senior citizens receive a \$65,300 exemption. More than 900 senior citizens throughout the District received a reduction in their tax bills for the 2014-2015 school year.

Should the 2015-2016 budget be defeated and the above contingency budget be adopted, the Victor Central School District Board of Education will make the final determination of budget cuts in a contingency budget. The following is a list of options the Board may choose to eliminate or reduce: some athletic teams, administrators, teachers and support staff, and instructional programs. In addition, equipment purchases must be eliminated and all community groups will be required to pay for the use of buildings (please note that Section 2023 of the Education Law requires school districts to provide this statement of assumptions made in estimating the contingency budget).

### **Academics**


- In June 2014, 97% of our students graduated with a Regents Diploma, 71% earned a Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation.

# Students Get a Lesson on Global Citizenship

Twenty two Victor students traveled with the Global Competence Certificate (GCC) Program to Nazareth College this past March for the 5th Annual Global Citizenship Conference. This year's program entitled, "The Next Generation Living in a Pluralistic World" was designed to not only help future leaders improve religious literacy but also learn how to respond to intolerance and become familiar with the etiquette necessary to work in a pluralistic world.

Laurie Estochen, VCS English Speakers of other Languages (ESOL) teacher and GCC co-advisor said that hundreds of students from seventeen area schools heard from speakers who challenged their thinking. "Ian Mortimer, Vice President for Enrollment at Nazareth College told the group that there are two qualities employers look for in new hires, the ability to problem solve and a willingness to work with others who are different than themselves. News reporter Norma Holland of 13WHAM also dared students to question their own diversity. 'Look around you, if everyone in your circle is like you, it is time to branch out," she said.

In addition to learning from guest speakers, students were also able to participate in breakout sessions that addressed vital topics such as encountering world religions and cultures and globalization in the 21st century.

"The Global Citizenship Conference at Nazareth College is the one of the highlights of the Victor Global Competence Certificate Program each year. It is an opportunity to come together with other area high school students to discuss and exchange ideas about what it means to be a global citizen," Estochen said.

### Introducing Athletic Department Secretary, Linda Dillman



Endurance, commitment, passion and dedication are all qualities you might use to describe a seasoned athlete, but these same attributes apply to the woman behind our athletes and coaches, Victor Central Schools' Athletic Department secretary, Linda Dillman.

For the past twenty five years, Dillman has been

more than just the secretary to Ron Whitcomb, Director of Physical Education, Health and Athletics, she has been the ultimate team player for eighty athletic teams over three seasons that include more than 1700 athletes and 100 coaches. From scheduling contests to coordinating game supervision, confirming officials, preparing bus transportation, ordering supplies, setting-up team photos and managing special banquets, athletic signings and other events, Dillman's job is a sport unto itself.

Last spring, when Mother Nature decided to throw teams a weather curve ball, this thirty six year Victor Central Schools veteran did what she does best, rescheduled more than two hundred contests (and all of their logistics) in just two months! Given the magnitude of her job, one might expect Dillman to be a fierce force, and she is, in a quiet, unassuming way. This former Victor Central Schools cheerleading coach of 26 years knows better than anyone that the best support you can give a team needs to come from the heart. And that, it does. Dillman visibly beams with pride when she talks about her relationships with student athletes and coaches. "I'm a secretary, mother, cheerleader, photographer . . . I even teach etiquette," she laughs. Dillman will be the first to tell you that having a sense of humor is one of the most important parts of her job.

Whether she is behind the scenes helping to coordinate hundreds of games or on the sidelines cheering on players, including her own grandchildren, Dillman rarely takes full credit for her position.
