District's New Strategic Plan Looks at Success Differently

How do you measure student success? This seems to be an age old question and one that Victor Central Schools' staff are constantly working hard to answer. After all, education is no longer one dimensional. Today, more than ever, learning is multifaceted, multi-variable, multi-national,



set in a wide world of vigorous technology and captivating communities. Over the

past several years

the implementation of the New York State Education Department's Common Core Standards prompted many school districts, including Victor, to define what type of skills we want our students to leave VCS with – skills that prepare them for whatever life they choose - college, a trade, the military, work, family, and more.

Last spring, school administrators set out to get input from the community on what they think best defines student success, and over the summer they pulled together the valuable voices of these parents, staff, students and community members, merged them with student assessment data and implemented them in a brand new strategic plan.

On Thursday, September 10th, Kristin Swann, Associate Superintendent of Educational Services unveiled this new collaborative plan to the Board of Education, which later, unanimously approved it. Swann said that in an ever-changing world, this new five year plan keeps us grounded and driven at the same time. "It creates an anchor for our district which is important for student success. It provides significant clarity and focuses on what the greater community thinks student achievement should be. Moreover, it supports excellence and equity for all," she said.

As for the parameters of the new plan, Swann said they are simultaneously "loose-tight." "The most effective leaders are masterful at applying the concept of loose-tight leadership and we wanted our plan to represent those properties," she said. According to Swann, tight properties are what define our mission, our purpose, and why we are here. They are properties that are timeless. They are our values and they are non-negotiable.

Some examples of the "tight" parameters associated with the District's new plan include Board of Education goals, high

achievement standards, equity for all and customer service. Loose parameters, on the other hand, describe how we get there. These



parameters utilize a variety of possible pathways, from staff knowledge, skills and guidance, to the use of technology, sheer exploration, community involvement and parent participation, too.

"We value the partnerships we have with our parent and community volunteers because we recognize that their presence creates a more successful learning environment and, as a result, healthier students



- socially, emotionally and physically. The active participation of parents in our students' education, whether it is through volunteering



at a book fair, chaperoning a dance, or reading to their child at home is key to student success. Every collaborative act, however small or subtle, creates a difference," Swann said. Making a difference in the lives of children is the

ultimate goal of Victor Central Schools according to Victor Central Schools' Superintendent, Dawn Santiago-Marullo. "In order to ensure our students are prepared for life beyond VCS, their success must be defined by more than state assessments and our new strategic plan ensures that. While tests are a good measure for monitoring students' progress, they are just a small part of their success. They need to have so much more. Our new Strategic Plan looks at the whole student by addressing six critical keys to their success," Santiago-Marullo said. Critical Thinking, Creativity, Communication, Collaboration, Character Development, and Citizenship.

Santiago-Marullo says these "Six C's" are not only vital for our students' success, but will be an integral part of the entire Victor Central Schools' culture encompassing staff at all levels of the organization. How do



you measure student success? This seems to be an age old question but thanks to the hard work of parents, staff members and the community, Victor Central Schools has a plan, a Strategic Plan.

Five Students Named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists

Five Victor seniors were among sixty-three high school seniors from the Buffalo and Rochester areas who were named 2016 National Merit Scholarship semifinalists. Casey Brentnall, Giffin Fitzsimmons, Katherine Hartsough, Kathryn Rohring and Matthew Klein were recognized by National Merit Scholarship Corp., which has run the prestigious awards program since 1955.

A total of 16,000 U.S. semifinalists have been chosen to compete for 7,400 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$32 million. Six percent of the national contenders – a total of 962 – come from New York state.

Safe Routes to School Project Complete

Thanks to a Federal program known as Safe Routes to School, the Town of Victor has successfully installed a series of sidewalks in and around our schools that will provide a safe pedestrian link between neighborhoods and our campus. Three sidewalks in all were installed on our campus. The first link is from High Street at the Junior/Senior High entrance (west entrance) and connects to the existing sidewalks in front of the JH/SH schools. The second link starts on Lane Road (north entrance) and continues past the soccer field near the boulders and down past the fields on the east side of campus. This link eventually connects to the Intermediate school sidewalk by the tennis courts. The third link connects Latchmere Drive to the bus loop between the Primary and Intermediate Schools.

Victor Ranked No. 2 in State's Kerr Cup

This summer the Blue Devils placed second in the 2015 Kerr Cup standings, the annual competition managed by the New York State Sportswriters Association. The group scores results for championships over the course of the school year to recognize the best overall performers. In the overall category for Class AA schools, Victor finished with 44.5 points for combined boys and girls sports, second to Shenendohowa of Section II, which had 57.17 points. The Kerr Cup is named after Neil Kerr, the retired Post-Standard sportswriter who has been the driving force behind the New York State Sportswriters Association for more than forty years.

New York State School Boards Association Honors Two Victor Board Members

The New York State School Board Association's (NYSSBA) School Board U Recognition Program honored two Victor Central Schools' Board members this spring. Board President, Tim DeLucia received the Board Lifetime Achievement award and Board member Trisha Turner earned the Board Excellence Award. NYSSBA's recognition program is comprised of four achievement levels. Members qualify for recogni-

tion points by participating in NYSSBA developmental activities.
